Collaborative Conversation Goals for Secondary Students Aligned with Common Core Standards (CCSS LITERACY.SL9–10)

Active Participation

- 1. Actively participate in a collaborative conversation by initiating relevant questions, comments and requests for clarification related to a grade-level topic, text and/or issue
- 2. Prepare for and engage in a collaborative conversation using a variety of language strategies (reread, rehearse, question, identify key ideas, lift vocabulary)
- 3. Contribute to collaborative conversations and cooperative learning activities by adding relevant information or asking questions that deepen understanding when engaged by a partner(s)
- 4. Bring others into the conversation by asking the partner open questions directly related to the topic, text or issue
- 5. Closely and attentively follow a conversation by referring to key ideas and evidence presented in the text or lecture

Build Ideas

- 6. Build ideas during a collaborative conversation by posing questions and making comments that clarify, verify, enhance or challenge what the author or speaker says
- 7. Integrate ideas during a collaborative conversation by discerning and talking about central ideas and broad themes and identifying points of agreement
- 8. Use open questions about a specific idea in the text or lecture to engage self and others in a collaborative conversation
- 9. Vary aspects of a collaborative conversation based on purpose, audience, topic or issue
- 10. Express ideas clearly and thoughtfully using precise vocabulary and complex sentences
- 11. Evaluate how the group worked collaboratively to build ideas using a rubric

Self-Advocacy

- 12. Identify specific supports and modifications the instructor can make to facilitate meaningful participation in a conversation.
- 13. Evaluate how well a specific support or modification gives access to participation in a conversation
- 14. Identify ways to join a conversation, participate meaningfully and ask for thinking time
- 15. Intentionally use specific thinking and language strategies on a regular basis to engage independently in classroom language activities

Measurement: With diverse partners, across multiple texts, as measured by discourse analysis.
