

Some CEUs Facts to Help You with this Conference

A maximum of 2.4 ASHA and 2.2 SCECH CEUs are available at his MSHA Conference. Here's how CEUs work:

Each clock hour = .1 CEU. A Short Course is 3 hours = .3 CEUs. A Doble Miniseminar is 2 hours = .2 CEUs. A Miniseminar is 1 hour = .1 CEU. You can obtain a maximum of .1 CEU if you visit 4 Poster Sessions (1 Poster Session = 15 of your time). So, if for example at MSHA Conference, you take 3 Short Courses (9 hours) and 1 Miniseminar (1 hour) and visit 4 Poster Session (1 hour) you will earn 1.1 CEUs, or 11 hours of continuing education. If the ASHA CEU requirement is 30 clock hours over 3 years, that works out to 10 hours per year, and *voila*, you have earned the required hours by attending the annual MSHA Conference! Congratulations!

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


How to Use This Book

Unconscious Bias: Impact in Health Care

Speaker: Wanda Lipscomb, Ph.D., Senior Associate Dean, Diversity and Inclusion, and Associate Dean, Students Affairs, Michigan State University College of Human Medicine.

Unconscious Bias has been identified as a major concern in the health care. The COVID-19 pandemic elevated concerns about inequity in health care and varied outcomes across communities in Michigan. This session will introduce participants to the broad concept of bias. Bias is a partiality in favor of or against one thing, person, or group compared with another. Biases may be held by an individual, group, or institution and have negative or positive consequences. The session will include a definition of the two types of biases – conscious (explicit) bias and unconscious (implicit) bias. The primary focus of the session will be on Unconscious Bias - the science behind unconscious bias, assessing unconscious bias, types of unconscious bias, strategies to address unconscious bias, resources to learn further about unconscious bias, and discussion about how to improve efforts as a health care provider. Participants will be asked to complete a few activities that will underscore their individual implicit biases.

Keeping Up with Cochlear Implants: Guidelines for When to Refer Adults and Children

Invited Speaker: Teresa A Zwolan, Ph.D., CCC-A, Hearing First and Kelly Starr, M.S., CCC-SLP, Michigan Medicine.

Cochlear implants (CIs) have been FDA-approved for both children and adults for more than 30 years, and even though they are widely accepted as the preferred hearing treatment for patients with significant hearing loss, great confusion exists regarding when it is best to refer a patient for a CI candidacy evaluation. This is particularly true in recent years as candidacy has focused less on the patient's best aided performance and has placed greater emphasis on the ear to be treated, as evidenced by the FDA's recent approval for CIs in cases of single sided deafness (SSD) and asymmetric hearing loss (AHL). During this presentation, we will review test procedures being used to determine candidacy for a CI, review current indications for a CI, and we will provide recommendations regarding how to best determine when patients should be referred for a CI candidacy evaluation. The discussion will include a review of the 60/60 – a guideline developed to assist clinicians when making decisions regarding such a referral.

Ethical Dilemmas and Solution: Speech-Language and Audiology Practice Today

Putting The Pieces Together

Invited Speaker: Tera Sumpter, M.A., CCC-SLP, Seeds of Learning LLC.

Tera Sumpter's Cognitive Processing Model for Academic Learning provides a structure for assessment and treatment. A variety of cognitive processes are involved in learning including speech development, phonological processing, visual imagery processing for symbols, visual imagery processing for concepts, receptive and expressive language, and executive functions. All of these cognitive components are required for children to develop literacy skills, reading comprehension, content application, organizational and attention abilities, and reasoning skills for academic success. Weakness in one or all of these cognitive that professionals use a comprehensive and integrative cognitive model to assess and treat students so that a complete profile is revealed. Cognitive processes do not function in isolation. They are all related, and



therefore should be evaluated and treated in the same manner. This model of Cognitive Processing for Academic Learning provides an integrated and comprehensive framework for assessment and treatment. It assists the therapist in identifying the root of a student's learning difficulty, targets where the breakdown in processing is occurring, and highlights which aspects of development are impacting each other. In addition, it focuses on aspects of the child's cognitive growth. This model guides the therapist in developing a treatment plan that is individual to each child. Ultimately, we see academic improvement and independence in the students.

Faculty and Students of Historically Disadvantaged Groups: Considerations for Inclusion

The Role of the Speech and Language Pathologist in the Diagnosis and Treatment of VPI. Dos and Don'ts

Speaker: Pablo Antonio Ysunza, M.D, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, Ian Jackson Craniofacial Clinic Beaumont Hospital Royal Oak.

Velopharyngeal insufficiency (VPI) occurs when the velopharyngeal sphincter (VPS) is unable to completely seal anatomical closure between the nasal and oral cavities during speech. Palatal repair can restore VPS function but the prevalence of VPI after repair has been reported ranging from 20% to 40%. The combination of flexible videonasopharyngoscopy (FVNP) and multiplanar videofluoroscopy (MPVF) has been reported as the best approach for assessing the VPS mechanism and planning surgical procedures for correcting VPI. The management of VPI must be multidisciplinary. The Speech and Language Pathologist, The Orthodontist, The Otolaryngologist and the Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeon participate actively to individually customize a diagnosis and treatment plan.

Identifying and Responding to Human Trafficking

A native of Michigan, Sara and her family moved to Kalamazoo in 2000 after her husband Tom served 12 years in the U.S. Navy. During Tom's naval career, Sara served as an U.S. Naval Command Ombudsman and the Navy Wives Club President. Together they raised four children. Sara, a sustaining member of the Junior League of Kalamazoo, served as the State Public Affairs Committee (SPAC) delegate in the Michigan State Council (MSC) of Junior Leagues. SPAC meets monthly in Lansing with nine other leagues to discuss issues that affect women and children in our communities. In 2009 she was made aware of the issue of human trafficking and she could not stop thinking about it. In February of 2012,

Sara formed the Kalamazoo Anti-Human Trafficking Coalition (KAHTC) and she has made it her personal mission to raise awareness in her community, advocate for victim centered legislation, train those most likely to come in contact with a survivor, and to have services available in the community.

This class will address the dynamics of human trafficking and identify who is at risk. We will discuss how to identify victims and uncover their community resources.

The Trouble with Tech: How Electronic Toys Impact Language Learning Opportunities for Young Children

When asked how Eye Gaze AAC system work, very few people can explain the process of infrared light shining on the eye to collect visual data. Understanding these basic factors - how an eye tracker interacts with the human eyeball to predict a communicator's gaze point – can greatly increase clinician's critical thinking skills during an AAC evaluation. Qualitative data, addressing the phenomenology of graduate student perceptions of Telepractice inclusion during weekly classroom lecture was collected. Three major themes were identified: 1) Contributes to impact learning, 2) Enhances professional development, 3) Improves employability. Finding suggest Telepractice as a graduate level pedagogical tool has merit in academic training for therapeutic implementation, satisfaction with learning platform and professional application.

Therapy Dogs Increase Cortical Activation of Emotional Speech Centers of the Brain

Speakers: Nicholas A. Barone, Ph.D., CCC-SLP and Andrew Schinsky, BS, Central Michigan University.

Previous research has shown that physical contact and guidance from a therapy animal improve cognitive tasks outcomes, however no research has examined cortical activation patterns of subjects completing speech specific tasks with therapy dogs present. Broca's area (Brodmann's areas (BA) 44 and 45) and dorsolateral prefrontal cortex (DLPF, BA 46) have been consistently shown to be active in children and adults during verbal fluency tasks. DLPF (BA 46) has been shown to highly involved in executive control of language and processing of emotions (during verbal fluency tasks) has been shown using fMRI, FNIRS, and SPECT. However, no studies have shown cortical activation patterns in the DLPF and speech areas of the brain related to the presences of a service| therapy dog during a verbal fluency task. The purpose of this study is the examination the of effects of a service therapy dog on cortical activation patterns associated with the performance outcomes on verbal fluency task in typical adult females using FNIRS.

The Art of Caring for the Professional Singer

In Speech-Language Pathology, training in the evaluation and treatment of patients with voice disorders exist at the university and fellowship levels, and in early career opportunities. Interest in this area continues to expand as evidenced by the growing number of voice centers with fellowship-trained laryngologists and demand for the voice-specific clinical fellowship positions across the country. Preparation for caring for the professional singer goes beyond the basic understanding of voice evaluation and laryngeal imaging. It is imperative for the speech-language pathologist (SLP) to have a deeper understanding of the demands, vocabulary, psyche, and economics of the professional singer in order to provide optimal care. The ramification of recommendations made, or procedures undertaken by the voice team can have serious consequences in a singer's career. The margin for error can be slim. Moreover, a deeper understanding of the singer will help the SLP connect and win the trust of such patients. This presentation is meant to introduce the SLP to the specifics of caring for professional singers.

As our communities and schools grapple with the mitigation of learning loss due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the importance of learner engagement has become a critical topic of discussion. Findings of research in social neuroscience of social emotional engagement foster our ability to create supportive learning environments where social emotional engagement is a "fuel" for a child's learning. While standards-based instruction is our focus in the classroom, autistic students and students with diverse learning abilities are more likely to access the curriculum when they are "invested," "independent" and "initiating" with their peers and teachers. When school communities gain knowledge of how to measure and enhance student engagement within classroom lessons for not only students with autistic learning styles but all learners, we create a positive



school climate that is focused on the success of every student. The Social Emotional Engagement – Knowledge and Skills (SEE-KS) is a professional learning framework and approach that will be shared so that we can follow a Universal Design for Learning (UDL) framework when enhancing our instruction. Working with and Supporting a Gender-Diverse Population: How SLPs and Audiologist can Dismantle Oppressive Systems to Benefit Everyone

Code Switching Effects Cortical Activation Patterns at the Phonemic Level

Speakers: Nicholas A. Barone, Ph.D., CCC-SLP and Andrew Schinsky, BS, Central Michigan University.

Previous studies have proposed that Analysis-by-synthesis, an offshoot of the Motor Theory, may explain why we see activation of mirror neurons in the motor areas of the brain during speech perception of non-native sounds and words; however, no studies have compared brain activation and mirror neuron activation patterns between native and non-native speakers during categorical perception (CP) of phonemes.1,2 The purpose of this study was to investigate cortical activation in the motor, Broca's area, prefrontal, somatosensory, and auditory regions during CP of non-native phonemes in English speakers as compared to native Thai speakers using fNIRS.

Workplace Vocal Health Promotion Programs in School Settings

Speakers: Lady Cantor Cutiva, SLP, MSc., Ph.D., and Eric Hunter, Ph.D., Michigan State University.

Background: College professors are occupational voice users with different vocal loads due to their working conditions. Vocal health Programs usually included face-to-face sessions and practice at home to reinforce training. Tele-practice sessions and workplace sessions can be used to support vocal health programs to improve the quality of voice in college professors. Purpose: To determine the minimal characteristics of workplace vocal health promotion programs in school settings. Methods: This mini seminar will present results from 2 longitudinal studies designed to assess the effect of workplace vocal health promotion programs on teacher's voice functioning. Participants were teachers (and students) of elementary level and university. Voice assessment included self-reported questionaries, voice recordings for acoustics and perceptual analysis of voice. Results and conclusions: As we will discuss during the mini seminar, our results suggest a reduction of the occurrence of voice disorders, vocal fatigue, and hoarseness among teachers (and students) after the implementation of workplace vocal health promotion programs.

With advances in medical technology, more and more infants are surviving extreme prematurity and illness. Neonatal Therapy is a quickly evolving field of practice focused on promoting optimal developmental outcomes for infants in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). Participants will learn why infants are admitted to the NICU and how that environment can affect and infants' development. The scope of practice of a Neonatal Therapist will be broken down using a Dynamic Systems Theory Approach of Neurodevelopment within the neurobehavioral, sensory, motor, musculoskeletal, and aerodigestive systems. We will discuss the role of the SLP in this population as a feeding expert and provider of developmental care and touch on recommendations for follow up after discharge.

Gender Affirming Voice and Communication Services 101: Client-Driven Approach

Invited Speakers: Greg Robinson, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, University of Arkansas.

This short course will present a practical overview of Gender Affirming Voice and Communication Services delivered in groups and one-on-one using in-person, teletherapy, and hybrid modalities. We will discuss assessments, counseling, vocal warm-ups/ hygiene and common areas of focus, such as pitch, resonance, intonation, rhythm, and nonverbal communication. Participants will be encouraged to attempt to modify their own communication through experimental exercises. The philosophy of this approach will be a client-driven one embracing mindfulness, in which client is centered as the expert and guided in exploring how different modifications make them feel. We will discuss how the Speech-Language Pathologist can co-construct a safe space (or brave space) with the client, in which different speaking styles may be played with in order to find the collection of features that best express the client's identity to themselves and others.
