

Some CEUs Facts to Help You with this Conference

A maximum of 2.4 ASHA and 2.2 SCECH CEUs are available at his MSHA Conference.

Here's how CEUs work:

Each clock hour = .1 CEU. A Short Course is 3 hours = .3 CEUs. A Double Miniseminar is 2 hours = .2 CEUs. A Miniseminar is 1 hour = .1 CEU. You can obtain a maximum of .1 CEU if you visit 4 Poster Sessions (1 Poster Session = 15 of your time). So, if for example at MSHA Conference, you take 3 Short Courses (9 hours) and 1 Miniseminar (1 hour) and visit 4 Poster Session (1 hour) you will earn 1.1 CEUs, or 11 hours of continuing education. If the ASHA CEU requirement is 30 clock hours over 3 years, that works out to 10 hours per year, and *voila*, you have earned the required hours by attending the annual MSHA Conference! Congratulations!



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



Pre-Linguistics Skills, The Building Blocks For Communication

Speakers: Amanda Hopkins, M.S., CCC-SLP, LSLS Cert. AVT and Rachel Flynn, M.A., CCC-SLP, from Comprehensive Speech and Therapy Center.

When working with children who have complex communication needs, speech-language pathologists can find themselves asking, "Where do I begin?" The answer to this question is often pre-linguistic skills.

This seminar, geared toward speech-language pathologists working with children of all ages, will address what pre-linguistic skills are, including specific pre-linguistic skills and how pre-linguistic skills provide the foundation for communication. Assessment and intervention, as well as parent education and coaching strategies, will also be addressed.

COVID-19 and Accredited Autism Centers of Excellence: A Virtual, Multidisciplinary Approach

Speakers: Ashley Backus, M.S., CF-SLP and Katie Derkacz, M.A., CF-SLP from Henry Ford Health

The impact of an autism spectrum diagnosis cannot be understated for our patients and their families. As speech-language pathologists, it is vital to understand the role we play in ensuring our patients receive a differential diagnosis that connects them to necessary support. The COVID-19 pandemic challenged providers to adapt gold-standard autism diagnostic procedures to accommodate temporary as well as lasting impacts of the pandemic while upholding diagnostic accuracy. We will explore a multidisciplinary virtual diagnostic clinic developed in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Participants in this session will learn about the accredited approved autism center, roles of multidisciplinary team members, benefits and challenges of virtual ASD diagnostic procedures, implications for the practicing SLP, and resources of clinicians, patients, and families once the patient receives a diagnosis.

Understanding Voice Disorders Among Student Teachers: A literature Review

Speaker: Lady Catherine Cantor Cutiva, SLP, MSc., Ph.D., and Eric Hunter, Ph.D., from Michigan State University.

Background: Previous studies have identified several factors associated with voice disorders among teachers. One of these factors is the lack of knowledge and training on safe occupational voice use. Although student teachers are occupational voice users during their college education, they do not receive any courses, training, or information about how to use their voices during their occupational voice use, which is needed to increase awareness of voice care strategies that could help to reduce the high occurrence of voice disorders in this population. Nevertheless, the literature is limited. Methods: This literature review aimed to identify the prevalence and associated factors of voice disorders among student teachers. We followed the PRISMA guideline for the identification and screening of the papers. Inclusion criteria were: (1) papers published in English, Spanish or Portuguese; (2) published between 2000 and 2022; and (3) reporting data on the occurrence of voice disorders among student teachers. Results: In total, we found 10 papers about voice disorders among student teachers. All these publications report results among European student teachers. The prevalence of voice disorders ranged between 14% among Norwegian Student Teachers and 24% among female student teachers from Austria. Conclusion: Learning conditions among student teachers, and the lack of training on occupational voice use, increase their likelihood of developing voice disorders. This is a crucial problem because cause that future teachers develop this health condition even before starting their working life.

Rethinking Cleft Palate and Craniofacial Disorders Instruction: The How, The When, The Why

Speaker: Marissa Habeshy, M.S, CCC-SLP, University of Michigan, C.S Mott Children's Hospital: The Craniofacial Anomalies Program.

One of the biggest barriers to adequate speech treatment for children with cleft palate is that treating clinicians do not feel comfortable working with this population and are not well-versed in appropriate treatment techniques. The limited training that graduate students receive in this area has been previously documented. While cleft palate and craniofacial disorders are often embedded in medical SLP and voice courses, this presentation will explain why it would be more beneficial to embed cleft palate treatment within speech sound disorders and/or articulation and phonology classes. The aim is to help SLPs who work in the schools and the community to feel more confident about their ability to work with this population. This session will discuss additional solutions for bridging the gap between the craniofacial team and the treating SLP. Specific treatment strategies and videos will also be shared.

Facilitating a Linguistic System by Incorporating Language Across Modalities

Speaker: Katie Squires, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, BCS-CL from Central Michigan University

Traditional language therapy has often isolated oral language from written language. This has led to "piece-meal" therapy in which semantics, syntax, pragmatics, phonology, and morphology are treated as separate constructs in listening and speaking with little focus on how they integrate with reading and writing. Despite overwhelming evidence that oral language provides the foundation for the development of reading and writing (Adlof & Hogan, 2019; Moats, 2010), oral and written language have a reciprocal relationship (Blood et al., 2010; Fallon & Katz, 2011) in which instruction in oral can support growth in written and vice versa (Wolter & Dilworth, 2014; Berninger et al., 2013), and oral language deficits predict literacy deficits (Nippold, 2016; Conti-Ramsden et al., 2009), SLPs have not been utilized to capitalize on their knowledge of language to support literacy. Although it has been the position of ASHA for over two decades that SLPs play a critical and direct role in the development of literacy (ASHA, 2001), it was not until 2015 when the Every Student Succeeds Act was signed into law, that SLPs have had a more significant, public role in the literacy development of children. In this seminar, SLPs will become more confident in identifying aspects of language that need support and the connections those areas have to reading and writing as well as establishing meaningful goals that ensure students are not only successful in their speaking and listening skills, but in their reading and writing skills as well.

AAC, School-aged Transitions and Beyond: Considerations for Vocabulary Selection, Implementation and Access to AAC for Authentic Communication and Self Direction

We know that early intervention is best, but it's never too late to consider augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) for those children who are unable to meet all their communication needs with spoken language. AAC systems need to be ready to help students meet the communication demands of new environments, often with unfamiliar

caregivers, whether they are in the midst of their middle school years, approaching high school, or nearing graduation. Communication autonomy is more important than ever before because as individuals experience these milestones, they need to be able to communicate anything they'd like to with anyone, anywhere. It's not enough to make requests and respond to questions. However, research shows that AAC users may only have 55% of the concepts needed in adulthood represented in their vocabulary set. This session will discuss the importance of selecting age-appropriate vocabulary, taking into account issues such as current lingo, sexuality, safety, reporting abuse, and self-direction. It will also outline a transition plan for students transitioning to new settings or new grades, as well as ensuring graduates have AAC systems when they exit the school system.

Advantages and Applications of Patient Reported Outcomes Measures in Dysphagia: Use of the Dysphagia Handicap Index

Speaker: Alice K. Silbergleit, Ph.D., CCC-SLP from Henry Ford Health

Dysphagia has a negative effect on work, leisure and social situations. While instrumental evaluations provide valuable information on the anatomy and physiology of a patient's swallow, understanding clinical outcomes that matter most to patients is fundamental to delivering high-quality care. Patient reported outcomes measures (PROMS) consist of validated questionnaires that quantify health from the patient's perspective and provide a valuable method of understanding efficacy of treatment on the patient's quality of life and the patient's view of swallowing treatment progress. PROMS is at the center of shared decision-making, meaningful clinical research, quality assurance, and post-treatment care. This presentation will review the development of the Dysphagia Handicap Index (DHI), a clinically relevant, easy-to-use, statistically robust valid, and reliable patient-reported outcomes measure. The DHI has been cited as the most suitable dysphagia outcomes tool for clinical practice and represents the most promising tool in the assessment of dysphagia. Participants will learn how to score and use the DHI in their own practice to monitor patient self-perception of therapy progress. Several examples of how to use the DHI in clinical practice and clinical research will be provided so participants may apply the DHI into their daily practice, provide more information to insurance companies regarding patient quality of life and efficacy of treatment and provide robust information to referring physicians on treatment progress.
